Flowering Dogwood

Cornus florida

The Dogwood Family (Cornaceae)

Basic Description: Short tree with opposite, deciduous leaves, large white or pink flowers, alligator skin-like bark and small shiny red drupes.

Interesting Facts: Powder from the twigs and wood used as a tooth whitener, and the bark used as a treatment for malaria. A red dye can be made from the roots and a black dye from the bark. Host to the Spring Azure butterfly.

Flower: Appearing in mid-spring, the flowers are in small green tight clusters surrounded by 4 showy large white or pink bracts, 2" in diameter.

Fruit: A shiny, oval red drupe, .25 - .5" long, in clusters of 3 to 5.

Wildlife Value: Drupes are a common food source for birds as well as small and large mammals. Attracts native bees and beneficial insects.

Habitat: Deciduous woods, thickets, streams, river banks, shaded areas.
