

Two-Wing Silverbell

Halesia diptera

The Storax (Snowbell) Family (Styracaceae)

Basic Description: Delicate small tree or large shrub with branches growing from the base forming a multi-trunk with brown to reddish-brown bark. Light green, alternate deciduous leaves almost as wide as they are long, that are colorful in the fall.

Interesting Facts: Fragrant showy blossoms hanging down like little bells attract native pollinators. The seedpod when green is sour, but edible by people.

Flower: Clusters of two to six waxy, white bell-shaped flowers, 1" across, appear with new foliage in late spring.

Fruit: Oblong, green, flattened drupe, 1 – 2", with two wide and two narrow wings; woody, nutlike and brown when mature.

Wildlife Value: Flowers attract hummingbirds, bees and butterflies; and squirrels eat fruit.

Habitat: Moist well drained sites in the understory of larger trees.
